Barcelona make it Three out of Three



The Academy Cup has certainly grown in stature since our inaugural tournament 10 years ago. In that first tournament we welcomed Aberdeen, Coventry City, Hull City, West Bromwich Albion and the DDSL squad.

Since those small beginnings the tournament has grown to become one of the most prestigious tournaments in the Under 13 age group in Europe and we have welcomed to our local Club such internationally renowned clubs as Real Madrid, Ajax, RCD Espanyol, Arsenal, Celtic FC, Benfica, Olympique Lyonnais, Brondby IF, Austria Wien, Deportivo La Coruna, Olympique Marseilles along with FC Barcelona who returned this year for a third consecutive time.

In fact Barcelona not only returned to compete in the tournament they also went on to win the Academy Cup for a third time.

The games all kicked off on Good Friday morning as our Under 13 team lined up to play Bayer Leverkusen of Germany who were making their debut in the Tournament.

The Saints had the better of the play throughout the game as they looked to record an opening win. Leverkusen found the Saints a real handful and were forced to defend in numbers for much of the game.

Unfortunately despite a number of opportunities the Saints were unable to score the goal their play deserved and in a cruel twist of fate Leverkusen scored in the dying seconds of the game. A free kick floated to the back post was met with a firm header to give the Germans the three points.

The second game saw West Brom, who are the only visiting team to take part in all ten tournaments, play a scoreless draw against another German team making their Academy Cup debut, Borussia Dortmund.

The two games in the afternoon witnessed Atletico Madrid, who were also appearing for the first time, overcome Bayer Leverkusen 2-0 with Javier Alonso, who would go on to be crowned Top Goalscorer of the Tournament, netting both goals.

The next morning saw the Saints take to the pitch knowing that they needed to beat Atletico Madrid by two goals to stand any chance of progressing to the semi-finals.

Now as everyone knows the Saints have never been a Club that shrinks in the face of near impossible odds and our Under 13s made sure that this simple statement would be etched in everyone's memory for years to come.

Jamie Murphy opened the scoring for the Saints to see them lead 1-0 at the break. Atletico responded to the half time score by bringing on their top players who they thought they could "rest" against us. In a second half that seemed to last a lifetime, James McManus scored an absolute peach of a goal that saw the whole of Whitehall and Santry shake from the roar of the crowd as the ball hit the back of the net. Atletico were shell shocked and desperately tried to grab a goal back but the Saints put in a towering performance with David Leonard in goal denying the Spanish giants on several occasions.

FC Barcelona overcame West Brom 3-0 in the second game of the morning to see three teams through to the semi-finals.

The fourth team was decided early that afternoon in dramatic fashion. As both West Brom and Borussia Dortmund had finished on the same number of points and identical goal difference they asked if they could have a penalty shoot out to decide who went through, rather than the toss of a coin which was in the rules.

So before the games that afternoon five players from both teams took to the pitch to take their penalties and both teams scored four of their five spot kicks so in the end they had to settle for the toss of a coin and West Brom went through.

So the semi-finals saw St Kevins Boys face West Brom in what can only be described as a one sided affair. Despite taking the lead West Brom failed to match the Saints who were 4-1 ahead by the break. With the game in the bag the Saints relaxed a bit in the second half but still went on to win 5-2.

The second semi-final saw a first for not only Shanowen Road but Ireland itself as FC Barcelona faced Atletico Madrid.

We are all familiar with the current political context in Spain between both these famous cities so to witness both teams contest such an important game in our Club was truely monumental. As I said to some of the stewards that if someone had told you ten years ago that two giants of Spanish football would play against each other on our pitch you would have laughed at them!

It turned out to be a terrific game of football as both teams gave it their all and in the end it was FC Barcelona who proved the more clinical as they recorded a 2-0 win to set up a final showdown with St Kevins Boys for the third year running.

Easter Sunday saw both German teams contest the 5th and 6th place playoffs with Dortmund recording a 3-1 victory over Leverkusen.

Then it was the turn of Atletico to seal third place with a 2-1 win over West Brom before the much anticipated final between St Kevins Boys and FC Barcelona.

Both teams were lead out onto the pitch by our own Under 8s and a packed Shanowen Road watched and hoped that this would be our year!

Barcelona remembered the previous two finals against us, and the fact that they went to penalties, so were very much on their guard.

They started just like their senior team plays knocking the ball about crisply and the Saints were left chasing shadows and within fifteen minutes the Catalans were 3-0 up as their superiority shone through.

The Saints gamely battled to try and get a goal back but Barcelona were just too strong on the day and they ran out deserved winners

While the final was taking place a number of our volunteers were busy preparing the hall for the presentation. As soon as the teams went out onto the pitch our busy bees got stuck in as they brought

in the demountable stage, PA system, bunting and barriers to make sure that when the teams came in for the presentation everything looked spot on.

SKB Chairman, Michael O'Callaghan and Director of Football, Ken Donohoe both made the presentation of trophies for Leading Goalscorer (Javier Alonso, Atletico Madrid), Goalkeeper of the Tournament (Alex Honrubia Stefan, FC Barcelona) and Player of the Tournament which we were delighted to see was awarded to our own Sam Curtis. Derin Adewale was deservedly awarded the SKB Player of the Tournament award before Barcelona stepped up to lift the Academy Cup for the third time.

It was then time for the teams to depart as some had afternoon flights to get, others were later in the evening and Atletico liked Dublin so much they decided to stay longer than expected!

Saints Look to Repeat SFAI History with 4 Finalists

Last year St Kevins Boys created a piece of history by winning four of the five SFAI All Ireland cups available to them.

This year we are looking to repeat that wonderful achievement as we have four of our teams in the finals.

Our Under 12 DDSL Premier were at home to Evergreen of Kilkenny in the semi-final of the SFAI Sketchers Norton cup and it was looking like extra time and penalties might be needed to separate the teams until Ryan Markey was put through and placed a wonderful chipped shot over the advancing keeper into the net – check the goal out on Facebook!

They will face Cork team, Douglas Hall in the final who overcame our Under 11s in the other semi-final ruining our chances of an all SKB final.

The Under 13 DDSL Premier put the disappointment of finishing runners up to Barcelona in the Academy Cup as they faced St Josephs Boys in the semi-final of the SFAI Sketchers Troy Cup. This, as was anticipated, a classic cup tie with plenty of incident and plenty of goals with the Saints overcoming Joeys 3-2 to advance to the final where they will face Galway side Mervue United.

Our Under 14 DDSL Premier team travelled to Cork to face Mallow United in the semi-final of the SFAI Sketchers Goodson Cup. Mallow were looking to get to their second All Ireland final in three years so naturally enough there was a huge crowd out to cheer them

The Saints had to work hard to match the commitment and work rate of their opponents and went a goal up following good pressure with a Craig Moore header. The second half saw Moore add a second goal but Mallow never gave up and managed to get a goal back to make it 2-1 and the crowd really upped the volume.

It is testament to the mind-set of the Saints that they didn't let the crowd affect their concentration and they scored a third goal near the end as Chris Lotefa finished off a great run by Jamie Mullins to ensure their place in the final and a game against Cherry Orchard.

The Under 15 DDSL Premier overcame Letterkenny Rovers 3-1 in the semi-final of the SFAI Sketchers Evans Cup to set up a date with Cork side College Corinthians.

In 2016 the SFAI agreed that if a team from outside the Dublin region reached the final of the SFAI cup the game would be played in their home county so our own teams are going to take to the road yet again for the finals with our Under 12s and Under 15s playing in Turners Cross in Cork on Sunday 27th May and our Under 13s travelling to Galway on Sunday 13th May for their final.

We're not sure which county the Under 14s are playing in or the date but we're hoping it won't be too far away!!!

Meanwhile our Under 18s are looking to become the first Saints team to win the FAI Youths Cup in what has been a much travelled campaign for them to date. They are set to face Tramore AFC in the final which for some odd reason is being played in Waterford – a stone's throw from the opposition's home!!

Now we are well aware that all our All Ireland Cup finals are going to be played outside Dublin (except the Under 14s) but we would appeal to everyone to try and get along and support the teams as we look to create more history.
