Saints start their Trophy Collection



Our Under 13s with injured teammate, Luke Browne and the Troy Cup We are delighted to see some of our teams bring home trophies early in their respective football seasons. The change in the schoolboy year to calendar year football has meant that our teams are competing in SFAI finals mid-season allowing us the opportunity to collect some silverware early!

Our Under 13s were looking to retain the All Ireland title that they captured last year at Under 12 level with a visit to Galway in the SFAI Sketchers Troy Cup where they faced local side Mervue United.

In a first half that the Saints dominated but failed to score they rode their luck on occasion as Mervue looked to score from free kicks. One of these was on target and forced a save from goalkeeper David Leonard and as the ball fell dangerously in the goalmouth Luke Browne was on hand to clear it away.

The second half saw the Saints really shine. A great run down the left wing by Kevin Zeffi where he floated the perfect ball into the 6 yard box and Jamie Murphy was on hand to place it beyond the keeper.

Zeffi was involved, and scored, the second goal a few minutes later to put the tie beyond Mervue. Collecting the ball in the middle of the pitch he dribbled past the Mervue players and laid it off for Daniel Bergin who deceived the defenders by threading it through to Zeffi running away from goal. Zeffi rounded three defenders and shot from a narrow angle giving the keeper no chance.

From that point on it was all one way traffic and a brilliant run by Derin Adewale who combined well with Byron Preston should have seen Zeffi grab another goal but he was crowded out in the box.

Small Sided Games Sunday Mornings in College of Surgeons

Every Sunday morning sees a feast of football take place in the College of Surgeons where a number of our Small Sided teams play their games.

The format for these teams has been changing over the last number of seasons as the leagues try out different ideas.

The Under 8s and Under 9s normally have a panel of 10 to 12 players and these are spilt into two teams on the morning and play two 5 a side games lasting 24 minutes. At the end of the first game one team swaps over to the other pitch to play another game.
