2019 SKB Academy Cup Winners : Athletic Club Bilbao Sunshine greeted our 11th International Academy Cup over the Easter weekend and the tournament witnessed another Spanish team capture the coveted trophy.

Athletic Club Bilbao along with their colourful and cheerful supporters were the winners over the weekend. From their first game where they led 2-0 within 10 minutes and looked like they might go on to score many more - only to end up conceding two goals and in danger of losing the game - the team looked well balanced to go all the way! And they did this in style with a well deserved 2-0 win over Bayer Leverkusen in the final.

The Tournament kicked off on the Friday morning as our Under 14s faced newcomers Watford. Despite taking the lead through a Jamie Mullins goal, the Saints were defeated 2-1 and faced an uphill battle the following day.

The next game up on the Friday saw West Bromwich Albion take on previous tournament winners Celtic FC. Celtic had the better of the play in the first half but the second half was a different story and West Brom scored the all important goal to register three points.

That afternoon saw Bayer Leverkusen and Watford play out a 0-0 draw that didn't set the pulses racing.

But that all changed when Athletic Club Bilbao (*or Athletico Madrid as Dave announced*) took to the pitch for their opening game. With a cheerful bunch of parents and friends over from Bilbao there was a great atmosphere in Shanowen. Athletic Club Bilbao didn't disappoint as they registered two goals against Celtic in the opening 10 minutes and looked like they would add to their tally.

But credit to Celtic who turned the game around and scored two goals to equalise. If the game was five minutes longer we all thought that Celtic would have won but as it was both teams shared the points.

The following morning Bayer Leverkusen overcame the Saints 3-0 and the game was followed by a thrilling 3-2 win for Athletic Club Bilbao against West Brom.

And so to the semi finals, and first up saw Bayer Leverkusen book their place in the final with a narrow 1-0 win over West Brom. The second semi saw Athletic Club Bilbao overcome Watford by the same score.

Easter Sunday saw Celtic show the crowd why we rated them so highly for this tournament as they completely overwhelmed the Saints 6-1. Believe it or not it was 1-1 at half time but Celtic put in a second half performance that took all our breath away!

The 3^{rd} and 4^{th} place playoff game saw West Brom overcome Watford 3-1.

Our Under 9s, 10s and 11s all took part in the prestigious Oakham Tournament in April. This was the second year that we have taken part in this tournament but this year we opted to bring three of our age groups.

There are a number of prestigious teams in this tournament with the likes of Manchester United, Wolverhampton Wanderers, Leicester City and AFC Wimbledon all sending their Academy teams. Indeed St Kevin's Boys were the only non-English team invited to this tournament.

It took place in the scenic town of Oakham in East Midlands, which revolves around the very exclusive Oakham boarding school where all the teams were housed.

The playing facilities as well as the organisation of the tournament were $1^{\rm st}$ class.

This was a fantastic 3 days of football, the Under 10s and Under 11s had positive results against Manchester United and the Under 9s put up a great showing in what was their first trip away.

The rules of the tournament were different to what we have here for the Small Sided Game. There is no retreat line and the off side rule applies at all age groups. This was a steep learning curve for the players to get used to but one that once they did they thrived in playing with "real football" rules.

It is vital going forward, that the players are exposed to as many of these tournaments as possible as it shows the level they need to aspire to as well as the required standard of opposition they need to be playing against on a regular basis.

All coaches involved made reference to how much they learned over the few days and this will be hugely beneficial to the player's development going forward.

Overall it was a great experience for everyone involved with plenty of positive comments from both opposition teams and the organisers on the performances of the Saints teams both on and off the pitch.

The Times they are a Changing (again for schoolboy football)

We were delighted to see the majority of the DDSL voting to finish the current league campaign in June and to recommence the football season from the beginning of September, in the way that the traditional football season ran.

We, as a Club were never in favour of this idea of calendar year football citing the many problems that it would bring. In particular the idea of trials for young players at the worst time of year, December. We also had the total confusion of players being eligible/ineligible for the national cups due to the cups being run from September to May and the schoolboy football season from March to September.

At the time we pointed out that the core difficulty with the scheme was that come June to the beginning of September there would be difficulty with player availability due to holidays and clashes with other sports. In fact this difficulty coupled with teams disbanding after the summer where results had meant they had nothing to play for was one of the key reasons for the vote from the clubs to change back.

At a vote the previous week the NDSL had also voted in favour of the change back. A number of years ago they had also trialled the calendar or Summer league and found it to be unworkable.

The FAI had promoted this idea despite evidence to the contrary and advice on the outcome and had decreed that by 2020 all leagues would be calendar year football.

The Carlow league recently voted against the proposal and the Cork leagues look like they will follow suit. The Leinster Senior Leagues members and Wexford leagues were all opposed to the idea also.

It remains to be seen if the FAI and Rudd Dokter in particular agree with the will of the football leagues and revert to the September/May season.
